
Churches join for Ash Wednesday

Update from the Childcare Center

It is with a thankful heart to God that I can report that we now have 91 children enrolled in our childcare center. We also have 7 children pre-registered and waiting for space to come available in our nursery. Melanie Reeves, our Director, conducts tours of the center daily and receives several phone inquires every day. We have a new Assistant Director, Mrs. Wyndi Henson, who joined us in early February. Wyndi has an early childhood education degree and will head up our Pre-K program for the fall 2008 school year. Currently, we have a staff of 21, which includes both full and part time staff and three high school students who work in the center after school. We have already had to expand our two and three year old program due to demand that we did not anticipate. The Childcare Center Board of Directors continues to meet twice each month developing policy and giving guidance to the management team. With just over three months of operating under our belts we have managed to stay serious incident free. We could not be more pleased with the growth and operation of our center during our first 90 days.

The board and management team would like to take this opportunity to express a special thank you to all the volunteers that have been so generous with their time helping out at the center: the Tuesday night cleaners, the floor buffing, those helping out in the kitchen with food preparation, those assisting at the front desk, and the many other volunteers. We appreciate all you have done and would ask that you continue to pray for us as we work through this start-up period. We proceed with great faith in God's mission for the center and praise God for this opportunity to serve our community of children in such a special way.

Each time I visit the center I have the opportunity to meet parents and families who testify to the blessing that the center is for their families. I know that the path that took us to this place was difficult and the road ahead is still a little up hill, however, I am confident that we will soon be cash flow positive and then all those that have been so faithful in their giving can breathe a little relief. Until then, please remember the center in your gifting and if the spirit moves you, please give what you can. The center staff and Board of Directors are dedicated to doing everything we can to control costs and cap spending until we are cash flow positive. But every time I hear a mother or father express the blessing our center is to them I know that all of our hard work and financial sacrifice is truly an investment in God's kingdom.

By the way, if you have not visited the center since we opened and seen it in full operation, the members of the board of directors would be glad to take you on a guided tour so that you can experience the blessing first hand. Please remember the mission of the center in your prayers. I praise God for my opportunity to be a part of God's special work here at Cokes Chapel.



In August of last year, we celebrated the completion of the construction phase of our new Center; however, we were not able to begin operating the Center until mid-November. (Remember the long wait for the state to make its inspection?) In December, we made the hard decision to replace our first Director. Then in January, we asked our Associate Director, the Rev. Melanie Reeves, to become the official Director of the Center, and she has done an outstanding job in getting the Center up and running, often working long hours for several days in a row without a break. The Center has grown continually since January, and we now have a total of 100 children (full-time & part-time) enrolled in the Center. However, we still consider it to be in its start -up phase because it is not carrying itself financially. The goal is for the Center to be financially stable sometime this Fall after school starts.

As a community still growing in our faith, we have much to celebrate as we become aware of God's power and presence in our midst. Let us continue to pray that many lives will be touched as we reach out to our community for our Lord and His kingdom. To God be the glory, great things He has done – and is still doing!



On any given day, you can often find a fingerprint or two (or ten) on the glass doors entering the Childcare Center. As I clean it...again...I am reminded that on any given day, I can see God's fingerprints throughout the building and on the precious lives of those who serve and are served here.

Looking back, I could have missed out on this experience of God at Cokes Chapel. In all honesty, I never imagined myself in this position. God, however, always has the better plan. Thankfully, although tests showed enlarged tonsils and he now sleeps with a monitor, we praise God that His precious child is thriving. His mother will tell you that the love and prayers of the Godly women in his room give her a daily peace as she leaves her child in our care.

I have seen God's fingerprints in the after school room as the students share what they have learned from daily Bible lessons. I have seen His hand as one young man accepted Christ as his personal Savior and is now talking about his faith openly with his unchurched family.

I see God working in the lives of a congregation stepping out in faith and answering a call. I see His fingerprints as volunteers work diligently to pull weeds, cook meals, clean windows, mop floors, build shelves, and rock babies.

From the infant room to the afterschool room, and every room in between, whether it is receiving blown kisses through the classroom windows or giving hugs for scraped knee, God's presence is here. So, cleaning tiny fingerprints off of the front doors may be a menial task, but God can use even that to remind me that He is here and He is truly at work in this place! And I cannot imagine myself in any other ministry at this moment. Cokes Chapel Childcare Center is God's plan for me and for my family, and I am so grateful for the opportunity He has given me to see His work in this place.

Board of Directors' Perspective

The Board of Directors is an eight-member Board appointed and approved by the Charge Conference of our Church. They are responsible for the general oversight of the Center focusing on its policies, procedures, and operation. The Board meets twice a month, once as an official Board to make decisions and once in a working session. The Board also is divided into several committees, such as, finance, marketing, personnel, fundraising, etc. Needless to say, Board members are busy people working on a daily basis with the Center. Several of the members spend countless hours each week volunteering in the Center itself, maintaining the building, getting supplies, and supporting staff.

The Board wants to say a special thank you to all the volunteers from the Church that have also helped in the Center doing everything from cleaning bathrooms to pulling weeds. It is not an overstatement to say the success of the Center is the volunteers that support it so lovingly and freely.

Two major responsibilities of the Board are maintaining tight rein on the finances of the Center and maintaining compliance with all licensing requirements. The financial goal of the Board is to be very frugal with the finances without comprising quality care for the children. The operational goal is to meet or exceed our licensing requirements without comprising our main reason for existence – presenting Christ to the children and their parents.

The Board of Directors welcomes your interest and questions regarding the Center. You may call or talk with any of them at any time about any aspect of the Center. In fact, you are encouraged to do so. Sometimes it may seem as if they are not available or open with our Church community, but that is not the truth. The truth is that they have been working night and day to get the Center up and running.

Most of all the Board of Directors depends on your prayers for them and the Center. Please remember to ask God to bless this ministry every day in your prayers.

Financial Perspective

Our Childcare Center is a ministry of Cokes Chapel UMC; therefore, the Church is responsible for covering any monetary shortfalls the Center may experience. The current monthly budget for the Childcare Center is \$43,925, including the mortgage payment. The monthly tuition income at the present level is \$30,328. Monthly pledges and contributions to the Building Fund/Childcare Center from the congregation average \$6,175 per month. This leaves a deficit of \$7,422 per month. The cumulative total of the deficit since January has been \$25,327.

Now, where did the Church find \$25,327? Thankfully, the Administrative Council set aside \$20,000 a few years ago for emergency or special use, and we tapped into that reserve fund for \$15,327. In April, we also received a very generous one-time contribution of \$10,000. You may see these figures as well as the numbers for the Church's General Fund under the calendar on page 5.

Because of the terrific "above and beyond" support of many in our congregation in the past, the Finance Committee has been reluctant to make further appeals to the congregation. We have sought outside funding, thus far with limited success. Both the Church and Childcare Center are reducing and controlling expenses by requiring pre-approval for all purchases. The Finance Committee has prayed together and individually for guidance and for the financial miracle needed to get us through this period.

Where God quides, He provides. Believing God will provide as He has in the past, we now see what may indeed be His provision in the form of the economic stimulus package (income tax rebates). It is amazing to think that thousands of dollars will come into our households over the next several weeks, just at the time it is needed! Many of the Finance Committee and Childcare Center Board have made a commitment to give all or part of their tax rebates to meet this special need. We dare not overlook what may well be God's provision, and so we are asking you to consider donating all, or a portion, of this money to help fund God's ministry at Cokes Chapel. Thank you for your investment in the young lives and families touched by our Childcare Center.



The Enrollment Perspective

Someone recently made the observation that he remembered some early discussions about the Center being financially secure when it reached 90 children. So, the obvious question is, if we now have 90+ children in our Center, why are we still supporting it financially? The first answer is that the original plan for the Center was to build only the classroom portion of the building and to have only 100 children in the Center. However, the Building Committee decided to recommend to the Church that it build a community hall and youth room at the same time as the classrooms. In order to pay for the increased costs of the two additional rooms, the capacity of the Center had to be increased from 100 children to 160 children. The new plan was presented to the entire Church at a Church Conference on June 4, 2006 where it was accepted, and the construction phase of the project began shortly thereafter. Because of the increase to the capacity of the Center and the total cost of the project, we now need a larger enrollment than 90 children in order to achieve financial stability. The Board of Directors projects financial stability at around 115+ children, (stability means carrying itself) and financial security at around 140+ (security means producing income to retire the loan). If we continue adding children at our current rate, we should meet this goal in the early part of the new school year, hopefully, in September. However, there is the unknown factor of what will happen to our enrollment this summer; unknown because we are a new Center and do not have a history to help us with our projections. It is common in childcare centers for the enrollment to drop during the summer months. To compensate for this anticipated drop, we will be holding summer camps. The good news is that we do expect most of our children to return in the fall.

The second answer to the question is that the original projection of 90+ children was based on full-time, full-pay enrollment. However, the enrollment figures that have been reported to the Church since we opened the Center include part-time, daily drop ins, and partial tuition payments for some employees. The Board decided to add part-time and daily drop ins for marketing purposes in order to fill up the Center. Below you will find a history of enrollment at the Center, as well as a breakdown of our current enrollment by age group and by full-time, part-time attendance.




